Here's a wee reflection on something that happened to me today at Memorial Park cemetery.

Having lowered Mary's coffin into the earth and said the final words of blessing, I withdrew from the family, and stood in the shade of a stand of trees - while they took their time to say "goodbye". While there, under the trees, a man dressed up as a sailor and carrying a rose in his hand turned up, told me that his name was Joseph and that he wanted to be a religious brother. In slow and laboured speech, he told me that God loves the world and is sad when we are sad. I asked him about his flower, and he said he was going to give it away. I asked him "who to?" He looked around, saw my little group of mourners, and said "them". "Off you go", I said, and off he went. I watched from my distance. So it was that I saw how, on the day of her burial, Mary received a flower from a complete stranger called Joseph. I liked that! A God-appointed moment.
