Pastoral Letter during the third week of the second lockdown

6 September, 2021

Kia Ora Knox Community,

UPDATE ON ALERT LEVELS: Since it's not clear how long our part of the country will stay at Level Three, before hopefully moving down to Level Two, our current plan is to continue not meeting physically, but doing things online. A number of people have asked me "how long do you think we'll be at Level Three?" and I've replied "I don't know!" This is a matter beyond *our* control, and prompts me to recall the serenity prayer, written in 1951 by American theologian Reinhold Niebuhr (1892–1971):

God, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, courage to change the things I can, and wisdom to know the difference.

The office continues, for now, to operate remotely - but carry on ringing and emailing. Jane and Lynda will be happy to help you.

Harry Biggs speaks about his Covid-19 vaccination experience

I met Harry in 2013, when he arrived in Dunedin to live at Knox College, to study science at Otago University. He's now living in Tasmania. He recently posted on facebook, and has given me permission to share his post in the Knox Lockdown Newsletter. As you'll see, he's had a complicated experience through his vaccination, but still is convinced (as a scientist) that vaccination is what we all need to do. I think that Harry is 26 years old - and yes, he does claim to be related to Ronnie Biggs of the great train robbery of 1963. He's a delightful person.

I wasn't sure about writing this, but I think it's important. As I've had pretty bad pneumonia this year, I was eligible to receive a Pfizer vaccination earlier than people in my demographic in Australia. I obviously signed up for it, and received my two doses 3 weeks apart with their expected side effects (soreness at injection point, fever after second dose). I also was one of 40/1,000,000 that developed Pericarditis as a side effect of the vaccine a few days later. I had chest pains and palpitations and when I rang my GP I was told to go to the emergency room. Apart [from] the pain and pretty funky feeling heartbeat, my energy levels were fine and I walked home. I took Ibuprofen for the next week three times per day. I was back in the emergency room a few days later as I had incredible lethargy and couldn't walk across a room, which turned out to be viral instead of heart related. It's been a week since then and I've had a follow up with my GP who says that I have recovered fully, and I'm off painkillers. My symptoms for the duration of my pericarditis were chest pains that worsened when I was lying down, and heart palpitations.

I'm writing this to encourage people to get vaccinated against COVID-19 as soon as you are able. None of the symptoms I've described above come close to what other people have described as both acute and long term symptoms of COVID, which can be genuinely life threatening. I had one of the worst possible reactions to the COVID vaccine and I have recovered fully, and whilst uncomfortable, still managed to even do work.

Please protect our friends and family, protect yourself, protect others. Get ******* vaccinated.
