The Baptism of Joseph David van Tulder

Introduction:

Brothers and sisters in Christ, we come now to baptize Joseph David van Tulder.

Baptism reminds us that God values each one of us. God's love is already around Joseph. God wants for him a life of love, joy and achievement.

Through this baptism we receive him into the fellowship of the church and begin to care for him as a member of our church family.

In this act we are declaring our faith in God and we are stating our responsibility as parents, grandparents, extended family, friends, and as Christians, to help Joseph to grow into someone who will be able, with energy and joy, to live a life of faith, hope and love.

By sharing this sacrament we all take on ourselves the responsibility to play our part in spreading love, joy, hope and faith to all people.

(Joseph's parents, God-father, and other supporters come forward to the font.)

Baptismal vows:

Minister: (to parents) Do you promise, as far as you are able to, to build

your family life on the love and truth that the church

has taught us?

Parents: Yes, we do.

Minister: And do you promise to go on giving expression to

that love and truth, for the sake of your own child, all the children among us and every human being?

Parents: Yes, we do.

Minister: (to congregation) And all of you, relatives and friends, do you receive

this child in the name of Christ?

Congregation: YES, WE DO.

Minister: Will you endeavour to support him and his parents

through life with Christian love and understanding?

Congregation: YES, WE WILL.

The congregation stands for

The Prayer of Consecration

Joseph's sister, Charlotte, pours water into the font.

The minister says:

May God be with you.

AND ALSO WITH YOU.

Lift up your hearts.

WE LIFT THEM TO THE LORD.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

IT IS RIGHT TO GIVE OUR THANKS AND PRAISE.

Eternal God.

we thank you for the gift of water: in the beginning you moved over the waters to bring order out of chaos; from the great flood in the days of Noah you saved those on the ark;

through the Red Sea you led your people to freedom from slavery in Egypt; across the river Jordan you led Israel to the land you promised; in the waters of the Jordan our Lord was baptised by John and anointed by the Spirit.

By the power of the Holy Spirit, bless *this* water and Joseph who will be baptised in it; that he may be born anew of water and the Spirit, be raised to new life in Christ, and continue to be his faithful disciple; through Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom with you and the Holy Spirit be all honour and glory, now and for ever. **AMEN.**

The Baptism

The people remain standing for the act of baptism.

In the name of God, our Father; in the name of Christ our Lord; in the name of the Holy Spirit we baptise you.

The people respond: AMEN.

Lighting of the Baptismal Candle

Joseph's God-father, Steven Lawson, leads the **Baptismal Prayer:**

Loving God, you know us by our names, and we belong to you.

We thank you for your grace and faithfulness; for the new life you have created; for this child who has been born among us, and whom you have entrusted to our care.

You have given Joseph ears with which to hear, and eyes with which to see.

Bless too his mouth, so that he may learn how to laugh, and to use human speech.

Bless his hands and feet, so that he may learn to walk and dance and run.

Bless also his mind, so that he may learn from his own experience that everything you have made is good.

May he be secure within his family, growing in wisdom and strength, learning to take the ups and downs of life in his stride.

May we who are mature and responsible never cause him to stumble, but rather love him, and lead him to the truth.

Above all, may we help him to grow in knowledge of your love and acceptance and find fulfilment in following the way of Jesus Christ.

We ask these things in Jesus' name, **AMEN**.
