

We light a candle in the name of Jesus Christ, the Light of the world.







No one could add to or embellish the profound words that we have just heard from President Nelson Mandela. All of us are honoured, and I think almost all of us are surprised to have been included in this group chosen by him with his advisors. None of us here are public officials, but all of us have performed public duties. And I think collectively we represent a wide range of experiences and responsibilities and obviously many geographical areas. Despite the many world problems, some of which Madiba mentioned, we are convinced of the common goals of society - of peace, freedom, human rights, environmental equality, the alleviation of suffering, and the rule of law. Many pressing problems and the causes of suffering are not being addressed adequately because of their complexity, because of political pressures, or because of the fear of failure. We never intend, as a group, to compete with those who are working effectively to resolve a difficulty, or to meet new opportunities. Our efforts will be to fill needs that we determine through careful deliberation to meet the unquestioned goals of society. The elders neither want, nor will we ever have, any kind of authority - except that which comes from common moral values. Our other strength, and source of our influence, will come from freedom to act as we decide is necessary or desirable with no adverse political consequences in prospect of criticism from constituency or seeking public office. We will be able to risk failure in worthy causes, and we will not need to claim credit for any successes that might be achieved.

My prayer is that the great potential of the elders . . . might be realised through sound judgment, and through dedication, and through courage.

Let's Make Humanity Great Again

Being interested in World War 2 started in my childhood, thanks to my mother's own interest, and then through youth magazines. Later, in novels by Jewish writers who had been deported to concentration camps. Or should I say death camps? Especially Auschwitz.

I did not lose that interest while growing up, and a whole life will never allow me to know everything about all that happened during those six long and dark years of war.

But I know one thing, and that is that the war could have been avoided if the Allied politicians, especially France and Britain's, had been less blinded by their own convictions. If only they had not let Hitler run wild after having been humiliated by the Versailles Treaty.

The creation of the United Nations in 1948, and of the European Union later, has allowed nations to maintain peace and not start another global lethal conflict.

But is that enough? Can we simply endow these two institutions with our trust to protect us from another borderline head of State who tomorrow could be Putin, Xi Jinping, an American president, or a Third World coalition? The latter, such as Syria, or Afghanistan don't mind too much about UN laws. It makes me wonder whether we, the younger generation, have a role to play to secure peace in this world? We have a duty of memory.

The duty of memory is not a step back to keep us from moving on, but a booster shock to remind us of what one human being is capable of doing to another human being. We must take action, every day action, against any sort of dangerous extremist view -- be it political or religious -- with the means we possess: voting, petitioning, demonstrating.

We have all the tools in our hands nowadays to create great things, to serve and preserve peace! Our ancestors fought for us so that we would never have to see what they went through, and never allow it to happen again.


The internet is maybe the greatest tool to unite people around a common and universal cause, because Peace is not only a Western idea. Nobody wishes for war. Security and safety are the basis for prosperity.

Maintaining peace is a Need with a capital N. World War 2 showed us that the unsteadiness of one individual can lead to disaster and tragedy. All measures required need to be taken to stop that sort of person from ever leading a single country once more. Mankind must come together and unite. There are no races. We are all human. Colour does not matter. Personal beliefs matter even less. We have been gifted with intelligence: let us use it in the future for peace, not for war.

I am devoted to Humanity. Humanity with a capital H.

I believe in it. Let us make a world without human danger to our children.



Since the Mosque shootings in Christchurch on 15 March, Knox has responded in various ways. We have compiled a booklet containing some of our responses:

- 1. A short sermon preached at Knox two days after the shooting
- 2. Expressions of support gathered from Knox people to our Muslim neighbours within worship on 17 March
- 3. Expressions of horror offered to God by Knox people on 17 March
- 4. The Inner-City Ministers' Association's expression of support to the Muslim Community of Christchurch
- 5. The reading that Knox's minister read at the Inter-faith event at the Peace Bell in the Botanic Gardens on 24 March
- 6. The PCANZ moderator's pastoral response
- 7. The Inner-City Ministers' Association submission to the parliamentary select committee dealing with Prohibited Firearms, Magazines, and Parts Amendment Bill
- 8. In the light of public conversation following the shootings, with consideration having been given to the line between free speech and hate speech, a "thought starter" document written by the minister, giving a preliminary Christian critique about the nature of speech.
