

WELCOME TO KNOX

Knox Church is a congregation within the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. On 14 June, we explored, in worship, issues relating to one of the September referendum questions, namely that of the recreational use of cannabis. Next week (28 June), we will look at the other referendum issue: euthanasia.

Daniel thrives on pushing the limits of accepted practices and interpretations, to challenge audiences expectations and open them up to a whole new way of thinking and listening.
