Knox Church is a congregation within the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. The Knox Church Council has asked the Knox Trust to provide further funds to support the current strengthening work in the Knox Centre. The Trust has approved a further \$250,000 but requires this to be registered as an interest free "loan", to be repaid only if the property is ever sold. PCANZ rules require such an arrangement to be approved by the congregation, the Presbytery and the Church Property Trustees. A congregational meeting will be held immediately after the Sunday service on 27 September to ask for congregational approval.
