WELCOME TO KNOX

Knox Church is a congregation within the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. <u>Bishop Kenneth Carter</u>, of the United Methodist Church, Florida Conference of the United Methodist Church, writes:

In my own tradition, United Methodism, there is a hymn of reunion that is sung by the clergy at the beginning of our annual conferences. It was written by Charles Wesley and is entitled, "And Are We Yet Alive?" It has been sung in these gatherings by Methodists since the 1780s. It begins by naming the power of reunion.

So, this hymn is something of an historical artefact, but also an illustration of the Christian community's desire to sing the theme of "reunion".

Hymn:



- And are we yet alive, and see each other's face? Glory and praise to Jesus give for His redeeming grace.
- 2. Preserved by power divine to full salvation here, again in Jesus' praise we join, and in his sight appear.
- 3. What troubles have we seen, what conflicts have we passed, fightings without, and fears within, since we assembled last.
- 4. But out of all the Lord hath brought us by his love; and still he doth his help afford, and hides our life above.
- Then let us make our boast of his redeeming power, which saves us to the uttermost, till we can sin no more.
- 6. Let us take up the cross till we the crown obtain:

and gladly reckon all things loss, so we may Jesus gain.

For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."

Deeply aware of the missing people in our lives and of the relationships that need either to be mended or to be released to God, we await the coming of the Christmas Christ, who will be, for us, our reunion with the One in whom we live, move and have our being.

The candle is lit.

In hope, we await the birth of Christ. **AMEN. COME, LORD JESUS.**




St Georges Iona - We will resume collecting for St Georges Iona – Christmas goodies as well as the essentials will be greatly appreciated.

Christian World Service Christmas Appeal

A story from Netani Rika of the Pacific Conference of Churches:

As the Covid-19 pandemic stretched its tentacles towards the Pacific last year, it became obvious that small economies would be deeply affected. Job losses loomed. Hunger – especially among the young, elderly, those with disabilities and women – was a real threat.

At the Pacific Conference of Churches, staff hastily bought seeds and found root crop cuttings to plant the Food Bank on land in the Central Business District of Fiji's capital, Suva.

While government and international agencies discussed the medical crisis, PCC staff planted tomatoes, cabbages, *kumala* (sweet potato), beans and cassava. The food garden – clearly visible from the main government and United Nations offices – yielded meals for children in squatter settlements just as Covid-19 hit Fiji. From this Food Bank, children were fed at least one square meal a day, allowing them to attend school with dignity.

Seeds were sent to Tonga and Vanuatu where similar initiatives helped the vulnerable members of society.

That food garden planted a seed in the hearts and minds of PCC staff and the secretariat has purchased 50 acres of land at Lawaki – two hours from Suva – to continue the Food Bank concept.

Launched on the Feast of St Francis of Assisi, the farm will be completely off the grid, using solar energy and water from a nearby creek. It will be free of chemicals, generating fertiliser from the 24 cattle on the farm and other organic material.

The initiative is called *Lomana Na Vulagi* (Love the Stranger), and will provide food for those in need, revenue for PCC and an on-site eco-school for young Pacific people.

Local communities have been approached and will be involved in all aspects of the farm with opportunities for learning and employment.

Central to the farm's ethos is the involvement of women, young people and people with disabilities along with using time-tested traditional agriculture and land management methods.

Advent in a time of Covid

As I prepare this message, the Scripture that resonates with me is Isaiah 9:2,

'The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of the shadow of death, a light has dawned.'

We approach this Christmas season under the long and dark shadow of COVID and an intense focus on the growing threat of climate change. And, Pope Francis, reminds us that these dark clouds, these shadows of death, are but the tip of the iceberg. The following quote is from his book "Let Us Dream: The Path to a Better Future" - surely a great title for an Advent series this year:

"The Covid crisis may seem special because it affects most of humankind. But it is only special in how visible it is. There are a thousand other crises that are just as dire but are just far enough from some of us that we can act as if they don't exist. Think, for example, of the wars scattered across different parts of the world; of the production and trade in weapons; of the hundreds of thousands of refugees fleeing poverty, hunger, and lack of opportunity; of climate change. These tragedies may seem distant from us, as part of the daily news that, sadly, fails to move us to change our agendas and priorities. But like the Covid crisis, they affect the whole of humanity."

In terms of the Isaiah passage, what is it that lights the pathway to a better future? We Christians believe that light comes to us in the Christ child. And we light the four-fold wreath of love, peace, joy and hope to remind us of this.

This year the lighting of these candles is particularly loaded with meaning and relevance for us.

As we light the love candle, we ask ourselves hard questions about what does Jesus-like love mean at this time? What does it mean to die to self and follow Christ in this situation? Do we care for our neighbours with agape-like self-giving and sacrificial love?

As we light the peace candle, we ask ourselves searching questions about how we maintain unity and a welcoming posture to all when there are deep divisions in society and our churches between the vast majority of vaccinated and the small minority of unvaccinated. May we avoid the labelling, demonising and summary dismissal of those we disagree with and instead find creative ways to live together in peace. In this, I am reminded of a passage similar to the one in Isaiah where Zechariah talks of his son John the Baptist in terms of:

'Shining light on those living in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the path of peace.' (Luke 1: 79)

As we light the joy candle, we ask ourselves where is the joy in times of such weeping and anxiety? This is a difficult one indeed! There are superficial answers, for example, the joy some have found in the slowing down and appreciating of beauty and relationship-building that has come from the lockdowns. But there is also the deeper resilient joy in the Lord, regardless of circumstance, that is so profoundly modelled for us in the writings of Paul.

And perhaps lighting the hope candle is the most powerful and significant of all. We light it with the conviction that not only is there a God, but the birth of Jesus speaks of a God who cares to the point of sacrificial engagement with our broken human condition. As we recall the powerful biblical theme of remembering, we remember that again and again, when all seems darkness and loss, God did not abandon us, and we can confidently say with John ...

'In Jesus was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.' (John 1: 4-5)
