WELCOME TO KNOX

Knox Church is a congregation within the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. We aim to create Christian community in which people of all ages, sexual orientations, cultural backgrounds and socio-economic situations are included as equally valued participants in our congregational life. We cherish our diversity, offering a safe place of belonging to any who wish to explore their beliefs in an atmosphere promoting discussion, the development of healthy relationships and spiritual growth. The Advent Wreath

Within our season of letters, today's candle is the candle of completion.

We suspect that when Paul spoke about God's completion of the good work begun in the people of Philippi, he was not speaking about cessation of love. We suspect he meant something more along the lines of love's "perfection".

Paul wrote:

Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end.

When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known.

And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love.

Deeply aware of the centrality of love in our faith, and equally aware of God's desire to nurture within us that which is good, we pray that love may overflow more and more with knowledge and full insight.

We await the coming of the Christmas Christ, in whose love the world may be "complete".

The candle is lit.

In hope, we await the birth of Christ. **AMEN. COME, LORD JESUS.**

Christian World Service Christmas Appeal



In the state of Tamil Nadu in South India, the Women Development Resource Centre is one of our <u>partners</u>, standing up for the rights of Dalit and Tribal or indigenous people. Through its 317 *sangam* or associations, the women have been agents for change. By training women to access their legal rights, it has enabled women to improve their livelihoods and treatment. People once known as 'untouchable' can attend school and get better jobs.

Muneeswari is one Dalit woman who knows what it means to stand up for your rights. A year ago she stood up to her supervisor when he demanded she cleaned his muddy shoes after he slipped in the field where she was working. For fear of losing her job, she did what he asked.

When the working day was over, she sought out the leader of the local women's *sangam*, supported by the WDRC. The women marched to the police station and refused to leave until the supervisor made a public apology to Muneeswari.

Muneeswari joined the *sangam*. She now has a house registered in her name. Her pay has nearly tripled and her son has begun studying at college. When her daughters are older, she has promised to send them to higher education as well. Her confidence has grown and like Zechariah she has learnt to speak. The women successfully campaigned for one member in last year's local government elections. They support each other and advocate for the whole community.

Although discrimination based on caste is illegal under Indian law, it is common especially in rural communities. Used to a cheap and a ready pool of labour, landowners and brick manufacturers have exploited them. Dalits are also the sanitation workers and waste pickers. They are often trapped in a cycle of debt to their bosses. The very act of getting an identification or ration card gives Dalit and Tribal people access to basic rights to food, work and shelter under Indian law.

Without human rights, people cannot participate in their communities or in decisions that affect them. The world is not a safe place for people who lack food, water and justice. Like the women's *sangam*, we need to insist that no one is left behind.

Your gifts to the Christmas Appeal and prayers and action for people who face discrimination and injustice can bring joy and justice this Christmas.
