# **Dear Theophilus**

a Series of Readings, Reflections and Musical Meditations for Advent 4 based on Luke's telling of the Christmas story

## WELCOME TO KNOX

Knox Church is a congregation within the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. We aim to create Christian community in which people of all ages, sexual orientations, cultural backgrounds and socio-economic situations are included as equally valued participants in our congregational life. We take care to use inclusive language in our services. References to God in traditional prayers and hymns may sometimes be gender-specific. As we pray and sing together, you're invited to adapt the words we've chosen.

## Note on a departure from the "norm"

In recent years, it's been our custom to hold a service of Nine Lessons and Carols on the Sunday before Christmas Day. Until the Knox Church Council met on Sunday 28 November to discuss plans for operating within the Traffic Lights system for Covid containment, we were working within a policy of not singing in church. Under this policy I really couldn't see that a service of carols would work. So I got on with organising a nimble alternative.

While I was organising the alternative, the realistic deadline required for the Knox Singers to prepare anthems for a service came and went. It's not fair to expect musicians to present material they've not had time to prepare.

Since then, of course, we've begun singing again. Our new position concerning singing, though, doesn't miraculously provide extra time for the Singers to catch up. So this year we have this service. It follows Luke's telling of the birth and infancy of Jesus, and I hope, in all its newness, it will be a fitting 2021 expression of our Advent hope and faith.

In the absence of the Knox Singers, many warm and hearty thanks to Alexandra Watson, who is working with Daniel to fill the gaps left by the usual choral input. Please find ways of expressing your thanks to Alexandra.

John later wrote:

We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked at and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life . . .

## **Christian World Service Christmas Appeal**


This year's Christmas appeal will support projects in various parts of the world, including Uganda



In Uganda Covid-19 has caused great harm. The official Covid death toll would be much higher if more people had been tested. Medical centres are unprepared and the promise of the People's Vaccine far distant. Schools have been closed for the last 18 months and incomes have fallen. But there has been joy in the southwest where the Centre for Community Solidarity has organised rainwater tanks, distributed facemasks made by young women and taught the HIV and AIDS caregivers how to protect themselves and their communities. Grandmother Sikora (*pictured left*) says her tank was a blessing from God. **Together we seek Covid Justice**.
