## WELCOME TO KNOX

Knox Church is a congregation within the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. We aim to create Christian community in which people of all ages, sexual orientations, cultural backgrounds and socio-economic situations are included as equally valued participants in our congregational life. When we pray the Lord's Prayer, you are welcome to use the language that is most natural to you.




## 3 famous "ships in strife" around New Zealand



The Wahine, sank in the entrance to Wellington Harbour, 1968. 51 people died.



Sailing for Tauranga, the MV Rena grounded on the Astrolabe reef, 2011. "Rena ship owners Daina Shipping, a subsidiary of Costamare, was reported to have spent NZ\$235m on the salvage and cleanup operations. Lloyds reported that the insurance costs for removal of the wreck were US\$240m.



The charitable association Cheong Sing Tong chartered SS Ventnor to return the remains of 499 bodies exhumed from 40 cemeteries in New Zealand to their homes in southern China. These men, mostly gold miners, were from the Poon Yu and Jung Seng districts of Guangdong Province. The ship broke up in 1902, sinking near the Hokianga Heads.
