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WELCOME TO KNOX

Knox Church is a congregation within the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. We aim to create Christian community in which people of all ages, sexual orientations, cultural backgrounds and socio-economic situations are included as equally valued participants in our congregational life. We cherish our diversity, offering a safe place of belonging to any who wish to explore their beliefs in an atmosphere promoting discussion, the development of healthy relationships and spiritual growth. We strive to be open to dialogue and shared experiences with people of other faiths. We enjoy worshipping the God made known in Jesus, endeavouring to do so in ways that are relevant to our daily lives, respect the integrity of creation, and make a positive difference to our wider world.

A loop system for hearing aids operates at Knox.

Toilets are available through the door on the lectern side of the sanctuary.

We take care to use inclusive language in our services. References to God in traditional prayers and hymns may sometimes be gender-specific. As we pray and sing together, you're invited to adapt the words we've chosen.

When we pray the Lord's Prayer, you are welcome to use the language that is most natural to you.

SOME NOTES ABOUT TODAY'S SERVICE

<u>Māori New Year?</u> This is the third year Knox has observed a Matariki theme on the Sunday closest to "Māori New Year", the day on which the constellation Matariki rises in the skies over Aotearoa New Zealand. We refer to it as "Māori New Year" because it has themes of endings and beginnings, letting go and looking forward. It happens at a time when the earth is sleeping, and when Māori gathered in their homes over the short days and long nights to tell stories around the fire.

Speaking the Names. Part of the story-telling was the speaking again of the names of those who had died during the previous year. Not speaking the names of the deceased after the tangi was part of "proper mourning" for Māori. When photography arrived, it became customary also to turn framed photos of the dead to face the wall. And then, at Matariki, part of what the community did was "shout out the name" and restore the image. Matariki was a time for speaking out again, with love, the names of those who had disappeared. This is part of our Matariki litany, happening later in the service. We've published notices over the last few weeks, encouraging people to consider names they might "shout out". When Matthew invites you to, please feel free to speak any names that come to mind.

<u>Matariki Stars and today's theme</u>. There are nine stars in the Matariki constellation. This year we are focussing on two: (1) Ururangi - winds of the sky, and (2) Waipunarangi - rain.

We are delighted this morning to welcome soprano, Deborah Wai Kapohe, who will sing some special Matariki music. Thank you Deborah!

Born in Southland, New Zealand,

as well as in the UK, Asia Pacific
Region, and South Africa.

Today, the service will not begin with the minister's usual greeting and welcome. The Bible will already be on the lectern. At ten o'clock, after a time of quiet, Deborah, playing the Pūmoana, will call us to gather.

She then will sing Dorothy Buchanan's (b. 1945) "Reo Karanga"

Tēnā koutou katoa

I write to update you on The Royal Commission of Inquiry into Abuse in Care.

The Royal Commission will conclude its Inquiry and present its Report to the Governor General later this month. As the Presbyterian Church has participated and cooperated fully with this Inquiry we will be included in the Report.

We now await the Report and recommendations and anticipate that the Commission's Report will not be an easy read as the Commission Chair states, "The whole country must pay attention when our final report is released and take responsibility to ensure that it never happens again".

The Government will table the Report in Parliament soon after the delivery to the Governor-General, this is when the Report and recommendations will be released to the public.

Although the Royal Commission into Abuse in Care is coming to a close, I cannot stress strongly enough that we want to hear from anyone who has experienced abuse involving the Presbyterian Church. As a Church we take our duty of care and any allegations of abuse and sexual misconduct very seriously. Our Church policy provides that any allegations of a criminal nature are reported to the Police, and complainants are supported to do so.

Should you wish to report or discuss any matter concerning abuse and the Presbyterian Church, I encourage you to do so in whatever way is right for you. You can contact our Complaints and Disputes Manager, email ComplaintsandDisputesManager@presbyterian.org.nz and free phone 0800 244 357. There is information on the Church website here on how to report abuse in the PCANZ.

The Church also has its own complaint processes to give any person who has experienced, or has knowledge of, any form of harm in our Church an avenue to raise these matters and seek justice.

If you wish to make a complaint through the Church's processes regarding any acts of inappropriate or unethical behaviour by a Church office-bearer or member, please contact the Complaints Manager as above, and see more information about the Church's complaints process <a href="https://example.com/hereita-bearer-nether-net

We are fully committed to keeping our children, churches, and communities safe; to supporting those who have been harmed; and to continuing to uphold our Christian values and principles. To this end all people representing or working for the PCANZ are required to abide by the Code of Ethics policy, and our Child Protection Policy must be applied when people in our Church have responsibility for children and young people. I encourage you to read both these policies if you have not done so. You can find these here.

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We also have on our website a number of resources aimed at keeping people safe, these include our preventing family violence resource page, our PCANZ White Ribbon NZ resource page, and our eminister service which provides a means to email with an ordained Presbyterian minister anonymously and confidentially.

Beneath our policies and processes lies our commitment to Jesus Christ who cares for and values all people and came so that all may have fullness of life.

Some of the most vulnerable people in our country have suffered enormously through abuse in their lives and this continues to impact them and a have a ripple effect on society. It is heart-breaking and deeply distressing. At this time let us continue to pray and to work towards justice, healing and hope.
