WELCOME TO KNOX

Knox Church is a congregation within the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. We aim to create Christian community in which people of all ages, sexual orientations, cultural backgrounds and socio-economic situations are included as equally valued participants in our congregational life. We cherish our diversity, offering a safe place of belonging to any who wish to explore their beliefs in an atmosphere promoting discussion, the development of healthy relationships and spiritual growth. We strive to be open to dialogue and shared experiences with people of other faiths. We take care to use inclusive language in our services. References to God in traditional prayers and hymns may sometimes be gender-specific. As we pray and sing together, you're invited to adapt the words we've chosen.



Free te reo classes - testing the water -

In October and November of last year, Knox hosted a series of five free classes in te reo Māori for fifteen people, followed by a visit to Te Kōhao-tū o Mahaanui Marae for a full day "getting to know us" workshop hosted by Ngāi Tūāhuriri.


Those in attendance considered the classes extremely worthwhile. The events were free, due to a funding grant provided by the Justice Compassion Trust.

Knox Council is keen to see whether there is sufficient interest for the classes and visit to happen for a second group of people. If there *is*, we will approach the tutor to see if she is available, and go looking for some funding.

In the classes, we covered the following:

- getting ourselves ready to do our pepeha
- learning some basic grammar and vocab,
- having regular practice of the Lord's Prayer,
- · having regular practice of the Grace,
- reviewing the congregational responses regularly used at Knox,
- learning some prayers before food,
- · learning a couple of hymns,
- looking at how some famous Bible passages go in te reo Māori (and how the two languages spin the meaning of those passages)
- · exploring some creation stories,
- exploring the difference between karakia and innoi

Lord Acton's famous quote, "power tends to corrupt and absolute power corrupts absolutely" was part of his review of Cambridge Professor Mandell Creighton's History of the

Papacy. Acton believed that Creighton had been insufficiently critical of some of the acts of three popes in particular. Initially, Creighton was offended and confused by Acton's criticism. Acton's attack, however, did lead him to rethink his own position. In an 1895 paper, he would write that the papacy, "which had been established for the promotion of morality" had in fact "provided the means for the utmost immorality."


