WELCOME TO KNOX

Knox Church is a congregation within the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. We aim to create Christian community in which people of all ages, sexual orientations, cultural backgrounds and socio-economic situations are included as equally valued participants in our congregational life. We cherish our diversity, offering a safe place of belonging to any who wish to explore their beliefs in an atmosphere promoting discussion, the development of healthy relationships and spiritual growth. We strive to be open to dialogue and shared experiences with people of other faiths. We enjoy worshipping the God made known in Jesus, endeavouring to do so in ways that are relevant to our daily lives, respect the integrity of creation, and make a positive difference to our wider world.

A loop system for hearing aids operates at Knox.

Toilets are available through the door on the South side of the sanctuary.

We take care to use inclusive language in our services. References to God in traditional prayers and hymns may sometimes be gender-specific. As we pray and sing together, you're invited to adapt the words we've chosen.

When we pray the Lord's Prayer, you are welcome to use the language that is most natural to you.

Prayer of Approach

We Christians of Aotearoa come to observe this Festival of Christ the King. **JESUS IS THE KING.**

Living within a constitutional monarchy, we have a King who lives in England.
Living within a bicultural constitution, we have a Queen who lives in Ngaruawahia.

WE ACKNOWLEDGE EACH MONARCH AS A GIFT TO OUR PEACE AND ORDER.

And yet,

somewhere near the heart of our modern constitutional understanding, is this democratic belief that proper order is met only when we get to choose our leaders -

THE VALUE OF THE WILL OF THE PEOPLE.

We wonder how your wisdom meets this intersection of principles - and whether maybe you smile at the thought that you need to be chosen. For while we know that to welcome the Christ is special, and that if no one ever did, then something would be diminished, part of us realises that, whatever our reception, you still would be "I am who I am".

YOU ARE WHO YOU ARE.

We come today to hear of a crowd given the opportunity to choose between Jesus the Lord and Barabbas the murderer. If we thought even once about what is good for us, we know how we would choose.

WE CHOOSE JESUS, THE LORD OF LIFE.

Well, as we explore what choice was made, we say

Lord have mercy.

CHRIST HAVE MERCY.

Lord have mercy.

Assurance and Response

You are forgiven and you are free.
THANKS BE TO GOD.

The Theme Prayer:

O God of sovereign wisdom and kindness, we struggle to discern well what is good for us and to choose wisely. We sometimes make choices that are not to our benefit or to the benefit of our neighbours.

THEREFORE, WE PRAY AN OPENNESS TO YOUR WISDOM, AND FOR THE NURTURING OF OUR CAPACITY TO RECOGNISE THE GOOD.

And when we get it wrong, help our prayer to be "HOSANNAH, GOD SAVE US!"

For we pray it in the name of the King, who taught us to pray, together saying
