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WELCOME TO KNOX

Knox Church is a congregation within the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. We aim to create Christian community in which people of all ages, sexual orientations, cultural backgrounds and socio-economic situations are included as equally valued participants in our congregational life. We cherish our diversity, offering a safe place of belonging to any who wish to explore their beliefs in an atmosphere promoting discussion, the development of healthy relationships and spiritual growth. We strive to be open to dialogue and shared experiences with people of other faiths. We enjoy worshipping the God made known in Jesus, endeavouring to do so in ways that are relevant to our daily lives, respect the integrity of creation, and make a positive difference to our wider world.

A loop system for hearing aids operates at Knox.

Toilets are available through the door on the South side of the sanctuary.

This is a communion service. The table at Knox is an open one. Members of any church, as well as any who are seeking God sincerely, are welcome to receive communion here.

We take care to use inclusive language in our services. References to God in traditional prayers and hymns may sometimes be gender-specific. As we pray and sing together, you're invited to adapt the words we've chosen.

When we pray the Lord's Prayer, you are welcome to use the language that is most natural to you.

The Call to Worship:

The Communion



Christian World Service Christmas Appeal 2024 Give Climate Hope this Christmas

The theme emerges from listening to our CWS partners in Oceania. Former Archbishop of Tikanga Pasifika, the Anglican Church in Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia, Winston Halapua speaks of a call from the world's largest ocean as "to



treasure God's gift of the planet earth. Fe'iloakitau Kaho Tevi, Advisor to the current Bishop of the Diocese of Polynesia and member of Christian World Service Board, recently described oceans as our hope. "We need to make ocean front and centre of our church, the message, the preaching, the discussions, the intercessions, the prayers." A focus on climate hope this Christmas also aligns strategically with the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, in particular Strategic Development Goal 13: Climate action



Weather Stations in the Solomons

In 1966, the island of Walande, Solomon Islands, had 200 inhabitants who had built houses flat on the ground. Over decades, more people built homes, and by 2002, there were 1200 inhabitants. But the sea was changing. People described feeling "scared" of what they called the "restless seas." They felt "out of control," unsure of the future for them and their children. When the church was flooded, people began

to relocate to live higher up on nearby islands. By 2016, there were only four inhabitants left. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=k2 GzkUne7g

In the Solomon Islands (consisting of 21 main islands and over 900 smaller ones), there are very few climate monitoring and weather station sites. This means little is known about climate change in this part of Oceania. Every one of the islands, however, has a church. In 2019, the Anglican Church decided to respond to the "restless seas" by using some of its churches to host weather monitoring stations. Local people committed to be trained as citizen scientists to record the weather. While the task is shared, it is led by a person commissioned by the church as a "green apostle," often a clergy person, who takes responsibility as part of their daily prayer for updating the booklet in which the weather measurements are recorded. These measurements can then be used for scientific analysis by the government and international organisations.



Tēnā koutou katoa

Advent...a time of waiting. A time to slow down somewhat and take the time to reflect as we approach the season of Christmas. To reflect on the coming of the Christ. A time for the weekly rhythm of lighting an Advent candle, for singing seasonal hymns and songs, to talk of hope, peace, joy and love. And a time when we are very aware of how this rhythm and focus differs quite dramatically from the rhythm and focus of society, of the world.

How do the themes of hope, peace, joy and love resonate in our world at this time? Are they just sentimental, soft words we throw about, or do they speak to our hearts and have their outworking in action?

The backdrop to this church season feels very discordant to such themes. Last week we had the formal public apology from the government by the Prime Minister to the survivors of abuse in care. I attended a survivor led gathering at the Pipitea marae in Wellington that same day and saw and felt some of the reality of how life is, and has been, for some of those survivors. And last week the contentious Principles of the Treaty Bill had its first reading in the house, eliciting protest, dismay and anger from many. Beyond our shores, across the world, there is continued violence, oppression and prejudice. Do our themes of Advent have anything to say, any power, any impact?

As Christians we believe that they do, and they must. That Jesus, the Prince of Peace, continues to be the way, the truth and the life. Jesus spoke into situations of brokenness, strife and prejudice and showed a different way in which to live. A way that led to life.

Rather than seeing these themes as soft and sentimental, we see them as strong and purposeful.

At weddings I have sometimes used a version of that popular reading from Corinthians which puts it this way... "Love is tough: there is nothing it cannot face. Love never loses hope, never loses heart". There is a sense of resilience, tenaciousness, strength in this that I believe is seen in the life and works of Jesus.

The pictures that accompany this message are of little Christmas tree hangings made by one of our church members. One for each of the weeks of Advent - hope, peace, joy and love. Can we use these themes to motivate us to action in our particular context? For instance, can we ask/challenge ourselves with questions such as, how can I bring a sense of hope to those in need around me – in prayerful and practical ways? How can I work towards peace where there is brokenness? We can be very intentional in seeking to incarnate the Advent themes into our lives... hope, peace, joy, love. We are all part of the Body of Christ. As we all seek to incarnate these themes into our daily living, we strengthen the presence and effectiveness of the Body of Christ here and now. And we do this in the strength of Christ and by the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

Enter this season of Advent with a sense of expectancy, and the knowledge that through Christ all things are possible.

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness and the darkness did not overcome it." [John 1: 1-5]
