WELCOME TO KNOX

Knox Church is a congregation within the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. We aim to create Christian community in which people of all ages, sexual orientations, cultural backgrounds and socio-economic situations are included as equally valued participants in our congregational life. We cherish our diversity, offering a safe place of belonging to any who wish to explore their beliefs in an atmosphere promoting discussion, the development of healthy relationships and spiritual growth. Prayer of Approach

The Passing of the Peace


Kia tau tonu te rangimarie o te Ariki ki a koutou. The peace of Christ be with you all.




Next week's service

includes a series of reflections and readings occasioned by the death, on 3 January 2025, of Dame Tariana Turia. The service is not intended to be a hagiography; rather, it is to give thanks for character traits consistent with some of the things seen in the life of Christ. The title of the service is "Character". While it might have made sense to pursue this theme today, Matthew wanted to stick with today's theme today, since it's something of a follow-up on what we began last week with the story of Joseph becoming the "protector".

In an article called "How Jimmy Carter lost his job and found his mission", Jeffrey Sonnenfeld, leadership expert at the Yale School of Management, noted that while Jimmy Carter achieved more during his one-term presidency than he often is credited with, some of his greatest achievements occurred after he left presidential office.

Part of that post-presidential work happened within a group called "The Elders" - a group of retired world leaders who had diplomatic skills but no current political roles that compromised their impartiality. The Elders worked in places of conflict to build peace. Following Carter's death

on 29 December 2024, the group summarised his contribution as follows:

A forthright and principled advocate for human rights and democracy, President Carter was a founding member of The Elders in 2007. In 2016, he stepped down from his front-line role as a member of The Elders. Praised by then-Chair Kofi Annan for bringing "the gravitas of his Presidential office but also the passion of an activist," he remains an Elder Emeritus.

During his nine years as an active member of The Elders, Jimmy Carter led and joined many Elders' delegations, including to Sudan 2007 and 2012; Cyprus in 2008 and 2009; the Korean Peninsula and China in 2011; South Sudan in 2012; Myanmar in 2013; and Moscow in 2015.

In addition to the visits above, the Middle East and the Israeli-Palestinian conflict was a consistent focus of President Carter's work as an Elder, promoting peace, dialogue and reconciliation. He joined Elders' delegations to the Middle East in August 2009 and October 2010, travelling to Israel, the West Bank, Egypt, Jordan and Syria to support efforts to advance Arab-Israeli peace. In October 2012, he visited Israel, the West Bank and Egypt to draw attention to the imperilled two-state solution and lend support to the Egyptian democratic transition. President Carter also led The Elders' delegation to Israel and Palestine in May 2015 during which The Elders continued to support a two-state solution, Palestinian reconciliation and an end to the perilous situation in Gaza.
