WELCOME TO KNOX

Knox Church is a congregation within the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. We aim to create Christian community in which people of all ages, sexual orientations, cultural backgrounds and socio-economic situations are included as equally valued participants in our congregational life. 

The Elephant







The Elephant, taking its title from the phrase "the elephant in the room", is a podcast series produced by Miriama Kamo and Mark Crysell. In this episode it asks "is New Zealand broken", and invites input from Dave Leteli (community advocate), Shamubeel Eaqub (economist) and Jacqui Maguire (psychologist). Near the end of the podcast, Jacqui describes "languishing" as the opposite state to "flourishing". Since we have been reflecting today on "flourishing", and since Advent is about cultivating the "new world", this podcast might be worth a watch.

Flourishing - being fully alive



In his book subtitled "Reclaiming the Spirit of Jesus", the late Bishop Geoffrey Robinson reflected on the famous phrase of Irenaeus: "The glory of God is a human being fully alive". "This is a marvellous statement" he says, "that is as strong today as it was when it was first spoken eighteen hundred years ago. It means that God does not find glory in millions of human beings bowing down in obedience and fear. God's glory is to be found in human beings who are fully alive. . . . This will involve the

development of the whole person – the physical, intellectual, emotional, social, artistic, moral and spiritual being. . . [T]o be 'fully alive' involves recognising our [lives] as God's gifts, greeting them with wonder and gratitude, developing every [life] to its full potential and seeking to use if for the good of other people, recognising the [lives] of other people and being grateful for them too, avoiding the futile comparisons between others' talents and our own, and accepting that every talent is also a challenge and hence a responsibility."
