Knox Church is a congregation within the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. A Note about the Service of Nine Lessons and Carols

In 1918, the Very Reverend Eric Milner-White, the Dean of the Chapel at King's College in Cambridge, shocked his congregation by introducing an innovation to the Chapel. It was a service called "The Nine Lessons with Carols". As the name suggests, the backbone of the service was a collection of nine bible readings, tracing the story of God's goodness from the fall of humanity, through the hope of the prophets, to the incarnation of God's Son, Jesus Christ. The lessons and carols were supported by anthems from the choir.

The fellows of King's College surprised themselves by responding well to the new liturgy, and it was decided to observe it again in 1919. It has been held every year since, and Churches all around the world have copied the format.

Statement from Canterbury Interfaith Society on the Bondi Tragedy



The Canterbury Interfaith Society expresses its deepest condolences and solidarity with all those affected by the recent tragedy in Bondi, Australia. Our hearts go out to the victims, their families, and the entire community during this time of profound grief. Such acts of violence remind us of the urgent need to foster compassion, understanding, and unity across all faiths and cultures. For us in Christchurch, these events strike painfully close to home. We still carry the memory of the mosque attacks

in our own city. These tragedies underscore the importance of rejecting hatred and affirming the values of peace, respect, and human dignity.

We also acknowledge the extraordinary courage and bravery shown by the local fruit shop owner, identified by media as Ahmed al Ahmed, who disarmed one of the attackers. His selfless act is a powerful reminder that even in the darkest moments, humanity and heroism shine through.

As our Co-chair reminds us: "God is One, Religion is One, and Mankind is One." These words reflect the essence of unity and shared humanity that we must uphold.

We call upon our communities to support one another, offer prayers for healing, and work collectively to ensure that love and empathy prevail over fear and division. In moments like these, let us reaffirm our shared commitment to building a world where every person feels safe and valued.

Knox collected Christmas gifts for PILLARS during November.

PILLARS have sent us, in response, an example of what these gifts mean for some of the people they support.

"Thank you S. (social worker) and Pillars Ka Pou Whakahou for all your support this Christmas. I am raising my four younger siblings after both our parents went to prison. Things have been very stressful this year, so this Christmas will be an important time for me and my siblings to come together and celebrate in our own way. Without having my own waka, it is tough to go out and do the shopping that everyone else gets to do for Christmas. It was so incredibly helpful to have Pillars support; the amazing Christmas kai and gifts dropped off to us so we could have things to put under our Christmas tree. Many thanks once again."
